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Elevator Festival is an opportunity for audiences to take a first look at new plays from the North East and beyond. When theatres were forced to close in 2020, Live made the decision to keep its creative opportunities open and support as many artists as we could. Our bursary programme awarded thirteen bursaries in total, the largest amount we have ever awarded, offering financial support, space and mentoring for independent artists with outstanding new ideas. Along with other creative opportunities from Live's talent development, this *Elevator Festival* begins to bring some of that work to our stages, and it is fantastic to be able to do so.

Intergalactic (Petals and Constellations) is a fast-paced debut play by Alison Scurfield where an unlikely friendship has cosmic repercussions. **The Twenty Seven Club**, a debut play by Chris Connel based on the book by Lucy Nichol takes a look at anxiety through the lens of nineties nostalgia. Along with a play reading of **Kailey** by Kerry Wright we are also welcoming the return of the **Elevator Scratch Night**, bringing you work-in-progress extracts of new plays by five and an opportunity for audience feedback.

For those with an interest in the innerworkings of the theatre industry we are also hosting an *Artists' Question Time* and workshops. It's a packed line up and I hope you join us to celebrate the beginning of these fantastic new plays. Graeme Thompson, Creative Producer

Johnny isn't one of the cool kids. He likes physics, space and Professor Brian 'saucepot' Cox. He is also struggling to move on from a family tragedy. But when new boy Hassan joins the school, forces of nature, seem to pull them together. Can this unlikely friendship save them and help them both aim for the stars? Alison Scurfield's debut play is a witty and tender tale about grief, growing up gay and the universe.

Endo The Line by Chess Tomlinson

Nix prepares for her Mam Karen's 50th birthday without the help of her younger disengaged siblings. The runnings of the household have usually fallen on Nix' shoulders since the death of her Dad. Karen is perpetually living in a heightened manic state and needs constant emotional guidance, but Nix' patience is running thin today. Even with the calming presence of her partner Jake and the fact that she's off her tits on morphine, Nix struggles to keep her secret.

Head Girl by Girl Next Door

Head Girl is a play about falling in and out of love with yourself. A coming of age story, that navigates the 21st-century girl boss mentality, whilst still practicing self-care seven days a week. Becca is running in the campaign for Head Girl at school and running herself into the ground, all with a smile on her face. But who is she doing all this work for?

Henhouse by Mhairi Ledgerwood

Henhouse is about Ben and Lee, two young men who fall in love while working on a farm. Their relationship is put under strain when Lee struggles with his mental health. Tonight's scratch will showcase 3 scenes from Act 1 of the play, which is currently in development.

How Was I To Know? by Papi Moises Jeovani

Papi will be performing an autobiographical piece, written in the form of spoken word poetry. It will start from the age of 10 all the way to the present day. He will also be taking certain creative liberties.

A Bouffon Play About Hong Kong by Isabella Leung

Set against the backdrop of this international city's skyscraper, the bouffons emerge from the swamp to tell the truth about their home. They must be careful with their choice of words, they must conceal their fear and anger, they must put those who abandoned them in their rightful place, and their weapon is humour. Laughter helps the bouffon to find freedom in an absurd world where politicians are comedians, soldiers and police are troubled poets, and at the centre of it all, a woman who has all the power, living a glamorous life of empty daydreams.

Play Reading

Sat 19 Mar, 4pm Kailey (Play Reading) Written by Kerry Wright Directed by Mitchell Vernals and Kerry Wright

Who cares for you when a parent is in prison? Based on writer Kerry Wright's own teenage experience, *Kailey* is a comedy drama about the turbulent journey of 18 year old Kailey as she tries to navigate life alone whilst her mum is caught in the prison system. Followed by a post-show event with the writer exploring the process of writing from personal experience.

Events & Workshops

Tue 15 Mar, 7.30pm Artists' Question Time

Elevator Festival kicks off with a forum in which artists and industry figures discuss and debate pressing artistic issues of the day and explore how we can work together and move forward from the pandemic. Hosted by Live Theatre's Artistic Director, Jack McNamara. Penel members include: Luke Barnes, Amy Golding, Lindsay Rodden, Ishy Din, Cameron Sharp and Wambui Hardcastle.

Sat 19 Mar, 11am Introduction To Directing

Live Theatre's Artistic Director leads a taster session for directors at the start of their creative journey, outlining the main roles and approaches a director might bring into rehearsals, from working with actors to thinking about design. Suitable for beginner directors or other theatre practitioners interested in moving into this craft.

Sat 26 Mar, 11am Directing Through Design

A practical session for more experienced directors and makers on how to work dramaturgically with design to push the impact and meaning of their work. Ideal for directors or practitioners who have already begun to create theatre but are looking to refine and develop its visual potential.

Online Panel discussion and Q&A Sat 26 Mar, 10.30am Mental Health In Drama

Streaming over Zoom this online panel discussion and Q&A explores responsible mental health portrayals in drama and comedy scripts, and how to avoid stereotypes and sensationalism.

Panelists include: Lucy Nichol - freelance mental health script advisor and author of *The Twenty Seven Club*, Jenni Regan - freelance mental health script advisor and author of *Isolation* and Victoria Bradley-Smith - junior storyliner (*Hollyoaks*) and former script researcher (*Coronation Street*).
